Your support of our mission is much more than a flash of generosity. It is a step toward building an equitable and inclusive nation, starting with our precious shared resources: parks. It is a journey that we cannot complete without your steadfast support. Thank you.

Letter from Superintendent Tara Morrison



The National Park Service (NPS) at National Capital Parks - East manages a diverse collection of parks, historic sites, parkways and recreational areas in the District of Columbia and Maryland. In caring for these sites, we also strive to be good neighbors and to serve community members and those who visit from far away. The NPS cannot do this work alone and values the work and commitment of partners in helping to achieve the NPS mission. Friends of Anacostia Park began with an idea in 2017 on how best to invest in Anacostia Park and its neighboring communities. Over the last few years, I witnessed the formation and was excited to welcome Friends of Anacostia Park as an official philanthropic partner in 2022. This is a testament to many people's efforts – all who are dedicated to supporting, enhancing, and championing the restoration, preservation, and activation of Anacostia Park. Together, we engage surrounding communities and improve access, experiences, and opportunities. In early discussions, it was clear the NPS and new Friends group must work to ensure the park is healthy for it to be a welcoming place that's beneficial to people's health and well-being.

Together, we have welcomed and engaged park neighbors and people from the broader community. Over the last year, Friends has increased park programming and presence in the park. From offering Late Skates at the only roller skating pavilion in the national park system to inviting community organizations into the park and serving our neighbors outside of the park, together we have made it a priority to reconnect people to Anacostia Park and invite those who have never visited to give it a try. Our shared goal is to make sure everyone feels that this is their national park – a place for respite and fun, a place to learn about the natural environment, and our collective responsibility to care for.

As we move forward, we are grateful to have Friends of Anacostia partner with us to ensure we hear community voices as we consider future investment in the park including improving access, enhancing recreational amenities, and making park infrastructure more resilient to flooding and extreme weather. In the meantime, we are working together to make sure the park is well-maintained and beautiful and will work together to seek funding for major improvements.

We could not be more excited about our partnership with the Friends of Anacostia Park and our work together to ensure that Anacostia Park is a vibrant and vital place—a shining example of a national park connected with its community.

FRIENDS CORPS



Our Friends Corps workforce development program turns the revitalization of urban parks into an opportunity to connect residents of underserved communities with meaningful work opportunities and transferable skills. We hire returning citizens, seniors and young parents—populations that are often overlooked as job-seekers—and empower them to lead in-Park programming and conservation, preserve the land and water, maintain the facilities and welcome visitors with a smile. As such, we increase community access to the Park by strengthening the culture of outdoor exploration in this mostly BIPOC region of DC.




- Stress management workshops

- Nutritional health seminars
- Double Dutch clinic
- Jewelry making classes

EXPERIENCE AP

From May to November each year, partner programming brings the DC community together and promotes cultural exchange. We work with other nonprofits that care about the Anacostia community to power events meant to unite the community and protect the social and emotional wellness of park-goers.








In 2022, FoAP convened residents at 5 different Late Skates—fostering kinship among 2,000+ attendees through:

- Free skate rentals
- Grilling
- Boat rides from the Anacostia Watershed Society
- Live skate performances from Rolloway Productions
- Music from DJ Graylin and the LinkUp DC
- Tabling from local nonprofit partners.







Our out-of-school program, Thrive DC, provides high schoolers from Wards 7 & 8 with safe, positive respite and recreation options. We co-created programming with local schools and community partners to promote:

- 1. Social and emotional learning
- 2. Cognitive and academic development
- 3. Reducing risky behaviors
- 4. Maintaining mental and physical health
- 5. A safe and supportive environment for youth

Our long-term objective is to build and strengthen the outdoor education networks that serve children and their families in stressed communities.

EXPERIENCE AP




In total, the Friends of Anacostia Park Friends Corps members facilitated 8 outdoor respite events for seniors and returning citizens during our 2022 programming season. As keepers of the communal story, older adults hold the potential to guide the equitable development of revitalizing spaces—especially when they feel a sense of connection to those spaces. FoAP's Senior Respite programming does more than simply show elders a good time outdoors; it also ensures that the restoration of the Park is rooted in a holistic narrative of the community that honors the folks who have enriched the land and water for decades. In partnership with Iona Senior Services, Victoria Square Senior Apartments, East of the River Strengthening Collaborative, Martha's Table, and the DC Hand Dancers, FoAP convenes local elders to experience the Park through boat rides, grilling, and fishing on the River.



ACCESS AP

Friends of Anacostia Park is the official nonprofit partner of the National Park Service (NPS) in Anacostia Park. We ask people living near the Park what improvements they would like to see, and we work with NPS to fundraise and turn those ideas into reality. The Development Concept Plan (DCP) is the National Park Service's planning process for moving forward with park improvements, and we are supporting NPS and the DCP by sharing residents' hopes and concerns for the future of the Park with NPS.









"

I've been in and out of prison for about 30 years. It's been a long time. I'm 71 years old now and it was hard for me to transition from prison life. I didn't know where to go.

I was looking for a job at MORCA (Mayor's Office of Returning Citizen Affairs), and a woman handed me a flyer. It said, 'No experience required' and it was at Anacostia Park. I came down and walked around a little while and said to myself, 'These people are doing something good here. I mean, really helping people.' So, I interviewed for the position, and I've been with the Friends Corps since.

The only place I ever found peace was in a park. I call it 'from the street to the sweet' because being here is comfortable. It's peaceful, and I don't have to walk around with my barriers up. People aren't fighting or mean-spirited. I see sharing and lots of genuine love.

Everyone feels good about what they're doing here—not just the Friends Corps but the community too. So I said, 'Okay, yeah. This is where I want to be.'

Wayne never shies away from the task at hand. Whether it's working with the grounds crew to remove invasive plants, building picnic tables, or roving the Park on a bike, Wayne says his "age is just a number". He hopes to continue seeing repairs throughout Anacostia Park–as well as more environmental educational activities for kids to learn about trees and other plants.







I want to help kids, period. When I was growing up, I didn't have anyone. Nobody was there to advocate for me. A lot of the kids that come down here need a role model, so I try to step up and be that for them. That's a really big thing for me.

This one little girl asks the team to set up my crafts table before I even get to work. She knows everything that I put on it too. When we tell their parents everything is free, they are like, 'For real!?' You should see the smiles we put on people's faces. All I want to do is serve and help. Some people are afraid to ask for help because they've been scorned for needing something. Not here, we make sure the environment is loving and caring.


My best friend brought her kids here after they witnessed a murder on a football field near their home. She took them straight to Mr. Holmes and Mr. Bobby (of the Friends Corps). Once they started talking, fishing, and just enjoying each other's company, their mindsets shifted. Just like that their nightmares went away. No wonder people love it here.

I'm thankful for this opportunity in many ways. It's hard to find work while I'm taking care of the boys. All three are in different schools. You should see me at 3PM trying to get to the first school; it's crazy. But, I've gained knowledge and resources that have helped me move towards my goals. We'll see what happens—I just know I'm blessed to be here.



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CY 2022 Expenses



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
